The Veterinary Medical Technology Program (VMTP) at Joliet Junior College (JJC) in Joliet, Illinois was a perfect fit for animal lover, Rachel O'Lone. She knew she wanted to become a certified veterinary technician (CVT) and was looking for a school where she could have some flexibility in her schedule yet had a program that would prepare her to pass the required board exams.

JJC offers an Associate in Applied Science degree in their Veterinary Medical Technology program. Students can complete the program within two years by going full time, or within four years if they choose to attend part-time and can attend classes during the day or in the evening. Rachel credits her success in school to hard work and the knowledgeable and caring faculty.

During her time at JJC, Rachel put her leadership skills to work, serving as the president of the Veterinary Technician

Club. It wasn't long before she realized most "pet parents" aren't aware of the many ways CVTs help their pets when they visit the veterinarian. Rachel became an advocate for changing the name of Veterinary Technician to Veterinary Nurse to help the public better understand the multitude of responsibilities CVTs have. Rachel explained her reasoning for the name change when was featured in the March 2020 issue of JAVMAnews. **"In the veterinary field, we are respected as nurses, but I think the public just doesn't realize what we do and all that we do,"** O'Lone said. **"One of my (human health) nursing friends said: 'Oh, I just thought you were the one who weighed the dog.' And I'm like: 'No, oh, no, no. I am running the anesthesia during surgery.'"**

Danville Area Community College's (DACC) Health Information Technology (HIT) associate degree program is accredited by the Commission on Accreditation for Health Informatics and Information Management (CAHIIM).

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

It would be another year before Megan was accepted into the program. During that time, she took biology and math courses at KC to meet the pre-requisites to enter the Radiology Pro-gram. She even got her Certified Nursing Assistant (CNA) credentials to ensure she would be a prime candidate for the program.

The KC Radiology Program prepared Megan for the 'real working world' and for passing the registration board exams. **"I can still recite some of the facts and definitions Professor Mimi Polczynski and Sharon Elwood hammered into our heads,"** she recalled. Megan especially appreciated that KC's program goes beyond teaching students how to be a quality Radiologic Technologist but exposes them to other specialty modalities in Medical Imaging. Truck driver Christopher Glazik knew it was time for a career change. He wanted an opportunity to work with people from his community, provide for his family, and be present in the life of his son. Christopher decided to begin the training that would eventually lead to becoming a registered nurse. He selected the Licensed Practical Nursing (LPN) and Associate Degree in Nursing (ADN)-Registered Nurse (RN) programs at John A. Logan College (JALC) in Carterville, Illinois. It looked as though Christopher had found the perfect program. However, as a single working parent, there was only one thing that stood between him and starting on the path to his future career, childcare.

Enter Career and Technical Education (CTE). The CTE system prepares individuals for high-skill, in-demand employment. CTE programs offer flexible scheduling,

work-based learning, and stackable credentials that provide a pathway from education to employment. CTE also offers other academic support services to help students succeed, such as childcare assistance. For Christopher, that childcare assistance removed the biggest obstacle he faced in being able to pursue his education to become a registered nurse.

Christopher completed the ADN program at John A. Logan, earning his LPN certificate as well as an Associate Degree in Nursing. Since then, he's had the opportunity to work in critical care and assist veterans. Christopher continued his education by completing his bachelor's degree, and he was recently accepted into a master's program.

both the Certified Respiratory Therapist (CRT) and Registered Respiratory Therapist (RRT) national credentials.

Thanks to the relationships the RC faculty has developed with hospitals and healthcare facilities in the area, they are able to help students obtain employment within the profession. The Respiratory Care Program Coordinator reached out to one of the clinical sites that expressed interest in Danielle, and recommended her for a student respiratory technician position. Danielle began working as a student respiratory technician while in the final semester of the program. She accepted a full-time employment offer from the same hospital, once her state license was processed.
